

WHAT IS HANNUKAH?

et me begin this brief bulletin message by raising the exact same question The Talmud asks: What is Hannukah? It seems odd to be asking this question about one of the most popular Jewish Holy Days on the calendar. There is a reason why The Talmud asks that question. Like with other Holy Days that were not included in The Torah, the Rabbis had to understand both the historical and theological nature of Hannukah. For us in modernity, it is important to ask that question because as time passes, new meanings are often assigned to millennia-old celebrations because of the context in which we live.

Hannukah is a beautiful celebration of light and much more. Hannukah is about the miracles of self-determination and rededication of The Temple in Jerusalem. Hannukah at its very core is a Holy Day about Jewish Identity. Believe it or not, Hannukah celebrates our differences with other peoples, and it also reaffirms our right to be free and diverse. In essence, Hannukah is one of the Jewish Holy Days with the most powerful universal message. The symbol of light is extremely important because it represents our everpresent ideal of making the world a better place and of bringing light and warmth to where there is only darkness, oppression, and sorrow.

As people who live in Twenty-First Century America, perhaps, the most important idea to understand is that Hannukah should never become a vehicle through which we try to compete or be like our non-Jewish neighbors. What do I mean by that? Well, it is a simple idea. Hannukah is not about competing with Christmas but should be exactly the opposite. It should remind us of the importance of remaining true to who we are. Hannukah was never intended in antiquity, nor in modernity, as a winter Holy Day through which we could feel we have an alternative to Christmas.

I am personally very happy for my
Christian neighbors and for the way in which they celebrate this important time of the year for themselves.
Simply put, Hannukah is not about trying to steal their thunder!

So, how do we make Hannukah "more Jewish" in a day and age when it seems to have been completely hijacked by commercialization and marketing? How do we make sure to kindle lights that really represent the essence of the light of who we are as a people and that continue shining long after they were supposed to be extinguished (for that is our miracle)?

I would like to suggest, instead of buying costly presents and props to help us celebrate, why don't we identify a couple of Jewish causes involved in Jewish education that could use our help, and make a generous donation to them? That, without a doubt, keeps our lights shining bright. Think about what it means to be able to educate our children as Jews in an environment free of oppression. We take that for granted so very often. Hannukah is a time to renew our commitment to those things that make us unique and different, and at the same time, will provide for a longer presence in this world for our people.

The Haftarah that we read on Shabbat Hanukkah has one of the most powerful verses in the entire Hebrew Bible. "Not by might but by my spirit says Adonai..." Let us have a hand in making sure the spirit of God is ever present in our world.

LET'S TALK TURKEY

ith Thanksgiving rapidly approaching, let's talk turkey...literally. I read a statistic that took me by surprise: it turns out that McDonald's does not have the most amount of fast-food restaurants in America. There is another chain that has more restaurants in the US than McDonald's AND Burger King combined... what is it? Subway. Eat Fresh!

According to the latest count, Subway has 24,798 restaurants in America. That's a lot of sandwiches. Speaking of sandwiches--what is the most popular sandwich that Subway sells? It's the turkey breast sandwich. This means, that here in America, the number one lunch item that we're buying daily, is a turkey breast sandwich. It turns out that Americans are kind of obsessed with Turkey, and I don't mean the country. It is estimated that the average American eats about 16 lbs of turkey a year, and about 736 MILLION pounds of Turkey are consumed in this country yearly. Additionally, 88% of Americans say that they eat turkey on Thanksgiving--which comes out to 46 million turkeys that are eaten on Thanksgiving day! And what about those other holidays? Well 22 million turkeys are eaten on Christmas day and another 19 million turkeys are consumed on Easter Sunday. That is a lot of bird! Turkeys are such an American icon, that Ben Franklin once wrote a letter to his daughter, proposing that the Turkey be the national bird of America. Now that didn't fly...but neither do turkeys (pun intended).

I want to present you with two questions: the first—why turkey? Now obviously it's delicious, however; historians have already dispelled the myth that Turkeys were served at the first Thanksgiving dinner. Spoiler alert: the pilgrims and the native Americans ate deer meat back in 1621, not turkey. So why has it become the go-to sandwich meat in the home or at the deli counter? The even bigger question I want to ask: is turkey kosher? Now before I get you all worried, I should say that I'm not trying to take any other meats away from you.

I've already taken pork and shrimp—I won't take away anything else! But I do want to have an honest conversation about what the Torah says about the kashrut status of these delicious gobblers. We're told in Deuteronomy, chapter 14 that animals that live in water must have fins and scales; hence the reason why catfish, eels, and shrimp are out as they do not have scales. We're also told that mammals have to chew their cud and have a split hoof in order to be eaten. Pigs certainly have a split hoof and almost look like they're wearing high heels but they don't chew their cud. And while rabbits chew their cud, unfortunately, they don't have a split hoof.

Then there are animals that are totally kosher, but we don't usually try eating them. For instance, when was the last time you had a giraffe? However, we're told that the list of acceptable birds must be listed in the texts of the Torah itself; unfortunately, a Turkey is not on this list. With that being said, allow me to take a moment to tell you something you already know: the Torah is a collection of documents that was written in antiquity, in the Middle East long before, North America (home of the turkey) would be founded with much less colonized. This presents a Kosher dilemma: is our favorite Thanksgiving bird kosher?

The answer is yes. But why? Well, several theories exist. One idea suggests that Jews began eating turkey from the time they arrived in America and since they were already eating it, it became an acceptable custom because it was now the tradition. Another school of thought believes that Jews began eating turkey once it became popular in Europe and that there was little debate about whether it was kosher, so it soon got the seal of approval. Whatever theory you subscribe to, just note that this argument has long been over, so feel free to enjoy your favorite Holiday bird this Thanksgiving!

Zack will be volunteering with Help of Southern Nevada to prepare meals for homeless youth in our community.




DAX SCHORR NOVEMBER 19TH, 2022

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
