

LIVE FROM HOSTAGE SQUARE (KIKAR HATUFIM)

he last time I was at the Tel Aviv Museum of Art, back in early 2022, the square in front of it was an open space with a few quirky sculptures. I took a picture, smiling at the irreverent art around me. But this time, in December 2023, it was a completely different place. One long table, much longer than the one we have at TBS, was set up for the hostages. There must have been over 200 place settings, and at each one was a sign that said "hostage." There were makeshift booths set up selling sweatshirts and T-shirts that said "Bring Them Home" or "It's not victory until they return," or simply "NOW."

Gathering together at Hostage Square, as it is now called, with a group of Conservative and Masorti rabbis from the US, Canada, and Israel, singing songs and offering prayers for the hostages, for the Israel Defense Forces, and for the souls of those who were brutally murdered in the October 7th massacre and its aftermath, was an experience I will never forget.

Our Israel mission went for three very full days, days that felt like weeks because of the intensity of what we were seeing and doing. On our last day, we left the hotel at 6:30 am for morning prayer at the egalitarian Kotel, dropped off socks and letters for soldiers at Sisters and Brothers in Arms, a volunteer-led organization in the parking lot of a large building in Tel Aviv, heard from a survivor of the Nova massacre, and visited with families of hostages. Hearing their stories, and how they hadn't had any contact with their family members since they were forcibly taken into Gaza, was incredible.

The day before, we had gone to Kfar Azza and witnessed the destroyed homes of the kibbutz that looked to have been, before October 7th, a little bit of paradise. Beautiful gardens surrounded the small houses, but the true beauty of this kibbutz was the community that lived there. Everyone knew each other; there were about seven hundred residents and an extended family. Sixty-two of them were killed, and eighteen were taken hostage. The wreckage was horrifying; I had a strong visceral reaction as my stomach churned and waves of nausea washed over me. Being there was certainly different from watching the news.

Next, we visited a special place for children in Kiryat Gat called Neve Hanna. They are a pluralistic group home/school, doing amazing, touching, and much-needed

work for children unable to live with their families. They took in more children after October 7th. Their rabbi, Liron Levy, brought in some of the madrichim (teen counselors) to speak with us and led us in an uplifting mincha afternoon service. They even had a small zoo with birds, goats, and other animals, a comfort for the kids. It was a joy for us mission rabbis to be here, especially after the painful sites in Kfar Azza. It was here that we donated small toys given to us by our congregants, knowing they were going to make some children very happy.

As I write this, the mission is over, but I'm staying on for a few more days. I am preparing to spend Shabbat with my family in Jerusalem. My cousin Ezra is twenty-seven and is home from the army for a couple of weeks. Last I heard, he had been called to serve up north. His brother Shaul and brother-in-law Beinish had also been called up for reserve duty. It will be good to see family and old friends who are living their lives in this new reality.

All in all, the solidarity mission was not an easy experience but it was a vital and valuable one. If you have the opportunity, I encourage you to go to Israel now. Even in a dark time, something hopeful is being shown by how individual Israelis are helping each other. They support each other, raise money for each other, and provide needed basic services. We, representatives of the greater Jewish community, have also shown up to help. As a people with a shared destiny, we have been through a great deal. The future is unclear but we can move forward in small steps because we have not lost hope in each other and in the power of community.

Am Yisrael Chai/the People of Israel live!

It has been over two months since the October 7th attacks in the south of Israel and it's no surprise to see the news cycle has morphed, the war in Gaza is no longer on the front page, and the hostages are relegated to a single sentence on the nightly news. We at TBS have not forgotten, we will not let the world forget and will continue to back our brothers and sisters in Israel and support them at every turn. This past month the TBS Family enthusiastically hosted and attended a community wide event sponsored by Jewish Nevada where we heard stories of the atrocities along with stories of exceptional heroism performed on that world-shattering day. We must not turn away but instead stay focused on the return of the hostages and an unconditional surrender of the enemy.

We at TBS are very fortunate to have an active presence in the defense of our people. Our congregation has stepped up and raised over \$300,000 for the war effort. With those funds TBS has purchased an ambulance and a motorcycle for Magen David Adom and has funded money for the blood bank and Mother's milk bank in the center of the country. The balance of the money raised will be put to good use in other areas of need. We will continue raising funds for humanitarian reasons, for people who have lost everything. To provide them with new clothes, food, housing, transportation, and everyday items that we all need to live our lives. These fundraising efforts were spearheaded by Rabbi Goodman and his congregants stepped up.

We are fortunate to have Rabbi Goodman as our leader. He is not only the spiritual leader, but he is a brave individual who will do anything to safeguard our people. He went to Isarel on a mission in November and was so moved by the experience, he is leading another mission this January. While I am unable to attend, I urge all of you to consider going with him and the other individuals from our congregation as well as some from the Las Vegas Jewish community at large.

Rabbi Goodman has offered up our facilities many times at no charge over the past 25 years for community programs and we as a congregation should feel proud that we can afford to donate our facilities for these important events.

Rabbi Felipe Goodman has been our leader for 25 years, we are truly grateful and humbled by his continued service to our congregation and to the local Jewish Community. It is for this reason that we are holding a 25th Anniversary Jubilee, it will be an event to remember, one that will be spoken of for months and years to come. DERECH ERETZ KADMA L'TORAH: BEING A GOOD PERSON IS THE FOUNDATION

remember the little folded note like it was yesterday. It was written in perfect handwriting, the letters slanted at just the right angle. My fifth-grade teacher, Mrs. Siegel, wanted us to know important things. She passed around personalized notes while we were sitting silently, repenting for our rowdiness. She was one of the few teachers who commanded strict compliance from our class. But earlier, on the playground, things had gotten out-of-hand amongst some of us.

"Those who respect you are worth your friendship," was the note I received. It certainly made me think about who was being respectful and who was not. And even now, as I look back, I think what a wise aphorism that was. I don't know what notes my classmates received, but mine was something to remember for the rest of my life.

Our tradition teaches us about the idea of *derech eretz*, which can sometimes be translated as "the way of the world;" however, it actually means so much more. *Derech eretz* is a way of behavior that binds us to each other as human beings and as Jews. It is traditionally seen as even more important than Torah. Before we live our lives in accordance with mitzvot, such as Torah study or observing Shabbat or holidays, we must live in accordance with *derech eretz*. We must treat each other in a respectful way, first and foremost.

In *Pirkei Avot*, one of our tradition's collections of wise sayings, we learn יָפָה תַּלְמוּד תּוֹרָה עִם דְּרֶךְ אָרֶץ, which means that studying Torah is beautiful when combined with *derech eretz*. Even the rabbis recognized that making an effort in both pursuits is sure to keep us out of trouble!

Helping our children learn to live with common decency and appropriate behavior is one of the most challenging parts of teaching and one that parents and teachers must work together to instill in them. Classroom behavior is influenced by whatever is going on in our children's lives outside the classroom, and it starts at home. Our religious school works hard to teach each of our children to behave as a mensch would behave in the classroom, just as parents want their children to conduct themselves in public. But there is only so much that we can do in the 5 hours a week in which we have religious school.

Children are always watching and learning from what we say and what we do, even when we don't realize it. If we behave politely, our children will learn to behave politely. If we treat others as we would like to be treated, our children will learn to treat others as they would like to be treated. If we clean up after ourselves, our children will learn to clean up after themselves. So, let's remember to be polite to others whether we know them or not. Let's make an effort to treat people with respect, to see that there is a human being in front of us no matter whether we are at the DMV, in a classroom, or at a crowded community event. Let's not take each other- classmates or teachers, parents or administrators- for granted. Let's try to clean up after ourselves, both literally and metaphorically.

As my teacher taught me those many years ago, being considerate of others is a core Jewish value. It is at the root of what we do to educate our children both inside and outside of religious school. Those students who are respectful benefit from more friendships, an increase in knowledge acquisition, and greater value added to their lives. Learning how to behave with *derech eretz* is truly something that will last a lifetime.
