THE BURDENS WE BEAR: THE ART OF PACKING FOR A NEW YEAR



Reminiscing about the "good old days" of travel, approximately 30 years ago, there was a certain charm in being able to bring a couple of suitcases on our journeys without incurring extra fees. Of course, there were restrictions on size and weight, but overall, leaving things behind was rarely necessary. Your original ticket covered it all, granting you the freedom to bring whatever you desired. However, our world has drastically changed. Nowadays, every time we embark on a plane trip, we find ourselves meticulously contemplating what to pack. Every pound matters and an additional bag can cost as much as half of your original ticket price. While some airlines boast of not charging for bags, others charge exorbitantly for the slightest excess.

The other day, as I stood at the airport, preparing to return home from our vacation, a thought suddenly struck me. What if we approached our lives with the same discernment as we do when packing for a flight? What if we thoroughly evaluated the necessity of every item we carry, not just physically, but emotionally and mentally? Better yet, what if we imagined that we would be charged for every unnecessary burden we insist on bringing along? Personally, when I pack for a trip, I am incredibly intentional and strategic. I avoid being weighed down and ensure I have space for the new treasures I will undoubtedly acquire. Ironically, my wife always looks at me perplexed, as my packing methods are far more organized than any other aspect of my life!

Consider this: Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur present us with a unique opportunity to assess the weight we carry, which can burden our souls and become increasingly costly on our life's journey. During these High Holy Days, our tradition encourages us to reassess the excess baggage we "shlep" around, so we can let go of unnecessary things that hinder our progress, cause stumbling, and ultimately exact a toll on our souls.

Therefore, I challenge each of us to examine our lives closely. Take a deep, introspective look at the grudges, petty rivalries,



Instead of fixating on how to pack and distribute the weight to avoid extra charges at check-in, let us focus on the freedom and lightness we could experience by leaving unnecessary burdens behind. If we can achieve this, we will understand the profound significance of the shofar blast marking the end of Yom Kippur. We will relish that extraordinary feeling of having precisely what we need for the journey, unencumbered by any unnecessary weight.

NEW YEAR, NEW BEGINNINGS

I've always loved Rosh HaShana. Every year when I was growing up, my family would gather for the seder with all the usual foods: apples & honey, beets, zucchini, and black-eyed peas. And of course, sweet pomegranate.

Perhaps this sounds strange to you, but to Persian Jews, it is traditional to have a seder on both nights of the Jewish New Year.

There are different components to the Rosh HaShana seder, and each item has its own unique blessing and symbolism. It starts with something familiar to everyone: apples and honey for a sweet new year. It also includes pomegranate, which is linked to hopes that the coming year be filled with as many good deeds as the pomegranate is filled with seeds. The rest of the foods are less well-known: leeks, zucchini (or baked squash), black-eyed peas, beets, and dates.

No one in my family ever mentioned the symbolism behind the seder foods. It wasn't until years later that I was able to find out the answer. So why did we eat all these different things?

It turns out mostly to be a play on words. The words were in Hebrew or Aramaic, the common language used in ancient times. For example, in Hebrew, the date or palm tree is called tamar. The blessing said over the date, using the word yitammoo, asks that evildoers be done away with. The root of yitammoo is tam, directly taken from tamar. Hence the date.

Leeks, vegetables of the onion family, are called kartee in Aramaic. In Hebrew karoot means felled, or cut off at the roots. The blessing over the leek asks that ill-wishers be felled. Zucchini are called karaa in Aramaic; in Hebrew karoah means to tear or shred. The accompanying blessing asks that bad judgments against us be torn up. Peas, called ruviah in Aramaic, are eaten after a blessing asking that our good deeds will multiply. Ruviah itself means numerous, and the Hebrew verb yirboo (to multiply) comes from the root rav. A blessing praying that our enemies will disappear from view is said over beets, called salka. The similar-sounding Hebrew verb salek means to disappear from view.

Some of these requests may be difficult to relate to. Yet there is more than one way of understanding them. Our "enemies" can be seen as attributes or qualities within ourselves that do more harm than good, like perfectionism, or self-doubt.
Our "ill-wishers" could include other negative personality qualities, like procrastination or hubris. The essence of the seder is our wish that things improve in the new year, that we continue growing and have new beginnings, including in our relationship with ourselves and in our relationship with God.

There is so much going on as the month of Elul becomes the month of Tishrei, as one year turns into another. First, we go through an ending. This is the entire month of Elul. Next, we have ten intense days from Rosh HaShana to Yom Kippur. This is a period of transition, when it doesn't quite feel like a new year has begun. Later, as Yom Kippur ends, we feel the beginning of something new. Finally, we celebrate with the festival of Sukkot, which culminates in Shmini Atzeret and the holiday of Simchat Torah.

It is interesting how these stages parallel life transitions: first something ends, then there is a difficult period of liminality, and ultimately something new begins in earnest.

While I was training to become a rabbi, somewhere during my period of liminality, I began to study a lot of Talmud. And what I found there one day was a discussion regarding foods to eat on Rosh HaShana. As it turns out, the seder of ritual foods is for Jews of all backgrounds, and the foods are called simanim. Abaye, a rabbi from the 4th century, lists several of them. The Tur, a commentator from the 14th century, remarked that Jews have always added to the list of simanim.

I discovered that some Ashkenazi Jews prepare tsimmes, a carrot-based stew, for Rosh HaShana. The Yiddish word for carrot, mehren, is also translated as "to increase." Preparing a carrot-based dish symbolizes the hope for abundance in the coming year. I learned that English-language puns can also be included in the Rosh HaShana seder: there are some punny people who eat celery, with almond butter and raisins, to bring about an increase in salary.

So there you have it: Rosh HaShana, the holiday of puns in multiple languages, using food as symbolism. I may have left some off; feel free to let me know yours.

Shana Tova u'Metukah!



ducation has always been central to the lives of Jews. There may be several jokes about the Jewish mother who wants her child to become a doctor, (even more so than becoming President), but jokes aside, we are a people who love to learn.

When I was in rabbinical school, the rector of our school, Rabbi Elliot Dorff, loved to cite statistics about Jews and education. One of them was that currently 80% of American Jews are expected to pursue a degree at a four-year school, compared with 41% and 42% of American Protestants and American Catholics, respectively. The value of a secular college degree is certainly important in our modern world. But I worry about the way it has become more important culturally than the value of our Jewishness.

Are Jews being educated in the fullest way? Or is something missing?

We encourage our loved ones to spend many years in school. We pride ourselves on being "lifelong learners." But what about our spiritual lives and our Jewish traditions? If we truly value these, we must become educated in them. And all education begins in childhood.

I truly believe in this, which is why I'm proud to be the Director of our Religious School. The children enrolled in our school just began in August, and already I see them learning new concepts. They are thinking about how to make blessings before eating, as well as why we do so. They are learning the meaning behind their Hebrew names, as well as how to spell them correctly in Hebrew.

And because it is "that time of the year," they are becoming educated in the rituals leading up to Rosh HaShanah, the Jewish New Year, and Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement.

I'm also proud of our Monday afternoon program. Creativity is brought to the forefront here, as our commitment to Judaism includes learning about the great Jewish artists, storytellers and writers of our time. This program underscores that there is much more to the Jewish tradition than some may believe. We are blessed to have educators to whom the arts are a true passion, and they bring this passion to our students. In turn, students are inspired and are bringing their own original innovations, as well as their personalities, into their projects.

Last but not least, is the Hebrew language which is taught formally on Sundays and more creatively in our Monday afternoon program, using Hebrew through movement. The goal is to learn Hebrew in a natural way, the way one learns any language. The first skill in language-learning is becoming familiar with the sounds, and then understanding what those sounds mean. Hebrew through movement is an incredibly fun, energetic way to make this happen. And it happens rather quickly, as I've seen first-hand.

It is wonderful to know that the school year is off to a good start. By committing to religious school, our students are learning that Jewish education is important. They are also learning that it can enhance not just one, but many dimensions of their lives.




