### SHAVUOT: THE STILL, SMALL VOICE OF SINAI

Each year, as spring gives way to summer and our minds begin to drift toward family vacations, school breaks, and lighter routines, there arrives a holiday on the Jewish calendar that too often slips under the radar. Shavuot—a festival of extraordinary spiritual power and historical consequence—can feel like the forgotten holy day. It has no dramatic rituals like building a sukkah or cleaning chametz. There are no candles to light for eight nights or lulav to shake. And yet, Shavuot lies at the very heart of our Jewish identity.

Shavuot is one of the Shalosh Regalim, the three ancient pilgrimage festivals alongside Pesach and Sukkot. In Temple times, Jews from across the Land of Israel and beyond would make their way to Jerusalem, bringing offerings and gratitude to God. Pesach celebrates our physical liberation from slavery. Sukkot reminds us of our spiritual vulnerability and reliance on God. But Shavuot—Zman Matan Torateinu, the time of the giving of our Torah—is when we received our mission.

According to rabbinic tradition, all souls of all generations stood together at Mount Sinai. We were there—our great-grandparents, our children, all of us. . We heard the voice of God, and we accepted the covenant: to be a people of ethics, of justice, of holiness. And every year, we are given the opportunity to receive the Torah again, as if for the Pirst time.

This is why the centerpiece of the Shavuot synagogue service is the public reading of the Ten Commandments. As we stand and listen to the words spoken at Sinai—"I am Adonai your God," "You shall not murder," "Honor your father and mother"—we are reminded that Judaism is not just a religion of beliefs, but a way of life rooted in covenant and conscience. The Torah is not simply a scroll on parchment; it is a living contract between heaven and earth.

But if Shavuot is so essential, why does it often go unnoticed?

Perhaps it's because it lacks the outward physicality of our other festivals. It arrives without warning—no buildup, no elaborate preparation. Perhaps it's

the time of year: just as people begin to unplug and relax, Shavuot quietly enters with a whisper rather than a shout.

And yet, the stillness of Shavuot is precisely what makes it powerful. It invites us to listen not with our ears, but with our souls. That is why on the first night of Shavuot, we engage in Tikkun Leil Shavuot, the tradition of staying up all night to study Torah. Why all night? Because our ancestors, says the Midrash, overslept on the morning of the Revelation. We stay awake to show our eagerness, our love of Torah, our readiness to receive. There is something profoundly intimate about sitting in study...

Shavuot also contains Yizkor, the memorial prayer service in which we recall our loved ones. This moment of remembrance grounds the holiday in personal rePlection. As we recall parents, spouses, siblings, and friends who shaped us, we sense that their spirits, too, stood at Sinai. We affirm that our relationship with Torah is not just historical—it is personal and generational.

To be chosen is not a statement of superiority; it is a declaration of responsibility. On Shavuot, we remember that we were chosen not for privilege, but for purpose. We were chosen to live lives of sacred obligation— to pursue justice, to care for the stranger, to sanctify time and space with meaning.

Let us not let Shavuot pass by unnoticed. Let us gather, study, remember, and celebrate. Let us stand again at Sinai—together—as if for the first time.


