MA'OT CHITIN IS AS IMPORTANT AS RIDDING OURSELVES OF HAMETZ!

The central idea of Passover is of course the liberation of the Jewish People from bondage in Egypt. Understanding that the main theme of the holy Day, is the idea of freedom and self-determination, is one of the time-honored traditions that is passed from generation to generation. However, there are other important themes that are part of Passover, and we must try to make them part of our celebration, even if it is not intuitive. Passover serves as a reminder of the struggles and hardships that the Israelites endured during their enslavement in Egypt, as well as their eventual freedom and redemption. The fact that we sit down to a Seder, where we experience the abundance of our times, the regenerative spirit of family reunions, and storytelling, is a reminder that we have not always had the luxury of doing things with freedom and in plenty.

During the Seder meal, when our families gather to retell the story of the Exodus from Egypt, using the Haggadah, we make sure to highlight the importance of understanding history, being aware of history's cyclical nature. The symbolic foods that we eat, such as matzah, bitter herbs, and wine are also meant to take us through the roller coaster of Jewish history using all of our sensorial perceptions. Passover is a holy day where we taste and touch history, not only talk about it.

In addition to the rituals and customs associated with the Seder, Passover also has a strong focus on social justice and charity. One of the key commandments associated with the holiday is to feed the poor and the needy. In fact, there is a specific mitzvah to give food to those who cannot afford it during the holy day.

This mitzvah is known as Ma'ot Chitin, which literally means "wheat money." The idea behind ma'ot chitin is to ensure that everyone has enough food to celebrate Passover, regardless of their financial situation. The practice of giving wheat or other food items to those in need dates back to ancient times, and it continues to be an important part of Passover observance today.

There are many different ways to fulfill the mitzvah of ma'ot chitin. Some families choose to donate money or food to local food banks or charities. Others might invite guests who cannot afford to celebrate the holiday on their own, so everyone has a place at the Seder table. Still, others might participate in community-wide efforts to collect and distribute food to those in need. Here at TBS we have an opportunity to fulfill this Mitzvah when we sell our Hametz by donating specifically for ma'ot chitin. One of our food drives, coincides with Pesach, to help replenish the food bank at the Jewish Family Service Agency. You can bring to The Temple food that you will not consume during Pesach and we will take it over to JFSA for distribution.

No matter how it is done, the mitzvah of ma'ot chitin is an important reminder of the values and principles that are central to Passover. It is a time to reflect on the struggles and hardships that our ancestors faced during their enslavement in Egypt, and to remember that freedom and justice are not just abstract concepts, but fundamental rights that all people deserve.

Passover is a holiday that has deep meaning and significance for the Jewish community. It is a time to celebrate freedom and liberation and to reflect on the values and principles that are central to Jewish tradition.

One of these values is the importance of feeding the poor and the needy. By giving to those in need, we can help ensure that everyone has the opportunity to celebrate Passover and enjoy the freedom and joy that it represents.

OPERATION SOLOMON: BORNE ON WINGS OF EAGLES

acheli Tadesa Malkai was only 8 years old when her parents woke her up in the middle of the night and told her it was time to leave their tiny village in Ethiopia. While she was too young to understand where they were going, she knew by the panicked look in her parent's eyes that they had to get out fast. So her family took her, and what little possessions they had, in the middle of the night and they began a treacherous journey to an airstrip in the region's capital city, Addis Ababa. You see, in 1991 things in the Ethiopian Jewish community had become very dangerous. The Government itself was on the brink of collapse and was constantly challenged by various rebel groups who threatened to take over. With these threats came an increase in antisemitism, mainly targeted at Ethiopian Jews living in the Gondar Highlands.

These Jews, who claimed to be descendants of King Solomon lived simple, but harsh lives in Ethiopia; and were now under constant harassment, and attack from other locals.

So with the help of the Israeli government, covert plans were made to air-lift over 14,000 Ethiopian Jews and fly them to Israel, in less than 36 hours. This project would later be known as "Operation Solomon." When Racheli finally arrived at the airstrip, she stood in line with thousands of other Jews, many of whom had never seen a plane before, and some who didn't know what a plane was. Racheli is quoted as saying: "When I got on the plane, I felt like I was getting into a big bird. A shiny black plastic sheet was spread out on the floor. There were no seats. They had been taken out so that there would be as much room as possible for people. I sat close to the window because I wanted to see what was happening. I remember my concerns. I said to my mother, 'Are we really going into the sky with this bird?' I had never seen planes before. She held me in her arms, and quoted the Torah from when the Jews left Egypt: "I bore you on wings of Eagles, and brought you to Me."

This verse, which is mentioned in the book of Exodus, in Parashat Yitro--has long since been a topic of conversation within our tradition. This line is uttered by God, moments before our people receive the 10 commandments at Mount Sinai. However, what God

means by this verse, is unclear.

Now obviously, God is attempting to make a metaphor here or trying to employ some sort of imagery because we know that the Israelites weren't flown out of Egypt on the wings of Eagles—they walked on land and then walked through a parted Red Sea. So, what does "on wings of eagles" actually mean?

Well, allow me to present you with an idea: When I was a kid growing up in Central Texas, my seventh-grade class went on a field trip to Lake Buchanan—because during the wintertime, the towering cliffs of this lake become a nesting spot for the American bald Eagle. I remember the tour guide on the cruise boat told us an interesting fact about the eagles that has stuck with me all these years. He told us that bald eagles prefer to build their nests on the cliff-side of the lake to prevent their young from being exposed to potential predators. Doing this, ensures that most other predatory bird species can't access the nest, however, the eaglets are at a greater risk of drowning, or injuring themselves along the cliffside, should they fall out of the nest prematurely.

Therefore, the only proper way to train the eaglets to fly safely is by essentially kicking them out of the nest and letting them flap their way down while the mother or father eagle flies beneath them, essentially acting as their safety net.

Dear friends, perhaps the reason why this idea has stuck with me for so many years, is because I think this is what God meant when God said "I bore you on wings of Eagles." God is telling the Israelite people, that while they might have felt like they were falling down—or crashing toward their oblivion, God was in fact, right there with them—holding them up, securing them, delivering them to safety. Likewise, it's my firm belief, that God was also with the Ethiopian community as well on that terrifying and stressful day when they boarded a plane and flew into the unknown. God was with them then, much like God is with us right now.

May we continue to pray that God acts as our Creator, our safety net, and our eagle.

s I reflect on my first year as the Director of Operations at Temple Beth Sholom in Las Vegas, one word comes to mind: whew! It turns out that running a synagogue is a bit like performing a high-wire act, blindfolded, in a hurricane. Despite the occasional mishap (let's just say that portable air conditioners during the High Holidays was not my finest moment), I am grateful to be part of this wonderful community and to have the opportunity to serve alongside such dedicated and passionate individuals.

I am pleased to report that we have completed the installation of a new cooling tower system in our facility. Should this be impossible, the hametz may be stored in such a way that we are sure not to use it during the holiday, and its ownership is transferred to a non-Jew until the holiday ends.

KNOW ALL PEOPLE BY THESE PRESENTS: That I, the undersigned, do hereby make and appoint Rabbi Felipe Goodman my true and lawful representative to act in my place and stead, for me and in my name and on my behalf, to sell all hametz owned and possessed by me, knowingly or unknowingly, as stated in the Torah and defined by the sages of Israel (e.g. hametz, hashash hametz—suspected hametz; and all kinds of ta'arovet hametz, hametz mixtures); also, hametz that tends to harden and to adhere to the surface of pans, pots or other cooking or eating utensils, of whatsoever nature, and to lease all places wherein the aforementioned hametz owned or possessed by me may be found, especially in the premises located at (your address here):


LEAH EPSTEIN APRIL 29TH, 2023
