In light of all of the events that we have witnessed in the past month, I have decided to travel to Israel to show our brothers and sisters not only my support but the support of our entire congregation. During my five-day brief trip, I will be joining a group of about fifteen North American Rabbis from all denominations.

We will be meeting with the families of captives, families of fallen soldiers, and families that have been displaced by the war. I have never in my life felt a most pressing need to embrace our people and let them know the warmth, the faith, and the hope we all need to feel by coming together! More now than ever our shared destiny and fate as well as our resolve should speak for us and be much louder than words. It is very important that during these most trying times our intention to stand shoulder to shoulder with our beloved State of Israel remains unquestionable.

We have received a list of items that I will be taking with me to distribute to our soldiers on the front lines. Please feel free to bring some of these items in person to The Temple by Thursday, November 9, 2023. I will also be purchasing some of the items, feel free to make donations to my discretionary fund to help with this specific effort.

Here is the list of items I will be taking with me:

- Non-drowsy Benadryl
- OFF Deep Woods wipes

Thermal clothing for men:

- The preference is for black or Olive-green items, sizes L-XXL
- Black thermal socks
- Black Thermal Pants for men
- Black Thermal Underwear Long Sleeve men
- Black Thermal Top and Pant Set for men

#### Magen David Adom Ambulance Update:

The response to our request to raise enough funds for one MDA Mobile Intensive Care Unit has been remarkable. Temple Beth Sholom has raised approximately \$210,000.00. We have already transferred enough funds to Magen David Adom to

procure one Medix
Type 2 Mobile Intensive
Care Unit Ambulance.
With the additional funds we
have received and the funds that

keep on coming in, we will be dedicating The Elevator Lobby of The MDA Underground Blood and Baby Milk Bank in The City of Ramleh in Central Israel. We will also be dedicating at least one MDA Medicycle.

If you still have not made a donation, please feel free to send in your contribution.

#### We Stand With Israel Signs Update:

Thanks to the generosity of many members of our congregation we have managed to print and distribute 1000 signs. We have run out of signs to distribute so we are printing an additional 400 that will be ready on Friday, November 4, 2023. We continue to suggest an \$18.00 donation per sign. All the money collected from the signs will be added to our Magen David Adom fundraising effort.

Please be proud and put the signs up. This is not a time to be afraid, it is a time to show the world who we are. Furthermore, it is a time to be proud of Israel and the way in which it has conducted the pursuit of righteousness and justice in light of The October 7, 2023 attacks.

### **ISRAELI IDENTITY: YOURS, MINE, AND OURS**

s I write this, we have not yet passed the 2-week mark since the massacre and mass kidnappings in Israel. Already, there has been a public showing of sympathy for Gaza, even as we are still identifying our dead. We have barely had time to mourn. We don't know where our kidnapped men, women, and children are or how they are being treated. What we do know is that the only reason they were attacked was for who they were or who they were assumed to be: Jews. It didn't matter if they were actually foreign nationals spending time with their Jewish friends. It was the deadliest hit on Jewish people since the Holocaust.

I have only been a rabbi for a few months, and I just completed my first high holidays in that special role. It's the role I've been dreaming of for a long time. As someone who loves the Jewish people, and Judaism, with my whole heart, I can only describe my feelings as being both heartbroken and angry. Not only for Jews but for humanity. How could something so violent happen inside Israel? How could others ignore the death of over a thousand Israeli civilians, and even blame them for it?

I started rabbinical school five years ago, in the fall of 2018. And only a few months later, there was the Pittsburgh synagogue shooting, the deadliest antisemitic attack in American history. Nearly twenty people were killed or wounded. It was a shock to everyone. How could something like that happen in America, the *goldene medina*?

These two brutal and horrifying acts of terror frame my rabbinical school years and my entry into the rabbinate. Frankly, it is a challenging time to be a Jewish person, let alone to be assuming a professional role in the Jewish world.

Even so, I am going to take my stand with Israel and with the Jewish people. It's who I am and it's who I am meant to be. On one level, it is factually who I am because I'm Israeli. I was born in Israel with two passports: one Israeli, the other American (through my father who is an American citizen). I grew up in California, but I was an American-born-abroad, and I've always had two places I call home.

I didn't have the luxury of traveling to Israel as a child, but as a young adult, I took ownership of my Israeli identity. I went on one of the first Birthright Israel trips, which for me was literally my birthright. It was a place both foreign and familiar. I wondered, what if my parents hadn't decided to move from Israel to California? What would it have been like to grow up as an Israeli? What if my Hebrew were better than my English? What if I learned Arabic as a supplemental language instead of Spanish? Would I have served in the army? What kind of person would I have become?

My thoughts about my Israeli identity were not only based on the fact that I was born there.

They were also because, as I learned family history, I realized that I was the first in my maternal line born outside the

country where our family had lived for generations. Before she moved to Israel, my mother was from Iran. At the time, it was a place with a thriving Jewish community. It was a place that she, as well as my aunt and uncles, and grandparents, proudly called home. And then, in the blink of an eye, everything changed! It became a country ruled by extremists. It became an oppressive regime known as the Islamic Republic of Iran. My family, and many others, had to leave the only home they'd ever known, never to return. I thank God that Israel was there for them, and for me, as it has been for Jews from all over the world since shortly after the Holocaust.

As I came of age, my group of friends included many young adults who were children of Israelis. They had grown up, to varying degrees, in California, but some had come to the US as teenagers or even after serving in the army. Together with one of my roommates, who had the same two passports as I did, we gathered together for birthdays, for Shabbat meals, and to keep tabs on the second Lebanon war from our living room in West LA. Later, some friends moved back to Israel, and I was able to visit them and spend more time there. Eventually, my visits to Israel were what ignited my passion to live an observant Jewish life, and from that sprung my journey to the rabbinate.

As your rabbi, I feel fortunate that we have been able to talk to one another and support each other. I believe that being together in a community will help us process the situation collectively. I also know that ensuring everyone's safety is a priority here. The solidarity gathering that we held at Temple Beth Shalom was attended by many of our elected officials- indeed, it was quite an education as a new Nevadan- as well as by the Las Vegas Metro. Their show of support provided me with a great deal of assurance.

For now, we send care packages and donations, and we stand united as a community in support of Israel. We're in this together, and that gives me hope that we're going to be okay.

# FROM THE PRESIDENT

ear TBS Members:

The past two weeks have been a very trying time for world Jewry and especially tough for American Jews. Even as the USA has steadfastly stood by Israel's right to defend itself there are still many within our country that feel otherwise and continue the narrative that this is all Israel's fault (and by proxy, all Jews). Is this not victim-shaming? Is this masking true antisemitism by saying the "Zionist Agenda" is to blame? The answer is yes to both.

October 7, 2023, is a day that will be burned into this generation's collective memory joining our people's long storied history of Slavery, Exile, Pogroms, and The Shoah. This day was the largest single concentration of Jews being kidnapped, maimed, and murdered since the Holocaust.

As someone who was born in 1967, just six months old during the Six Day War and who was 6 years old at the outbreak of the Yom Kippur War, and now 56 when tragedy struck our people (again) on October 7, 2023 – this tragedy has become a defining moment for our generation of Jews. The initial shock and grief gave way to anger, and the anger gave way to the desire for blood revenge and then eventually to powerlessness: I asked myself, how can I make a difference?

First and foremost, I started checking on my Israeli friends and colleagues asking them if they were OK and if there was anything I could do from here... This answer overwhelmingly came back; DO NOT STAY SILENT! Tell the stories of our people on social media and speak to whomever will listen (and even those that won't). And to send money to organizations like Magen David Adom, JNF, Jewish Nevada, and any organization that is sending 100% of the funds raised to help the residents of the Gaza Envelope. These are the times we find out who is with us, or who is against us. Staying vigilant and being aware of your surroundings is the mantra I am passing along to my family members and Jewish friends alike. If an atrocity like this can happen in Israel, it can happen anywhere.

Secondly, we are extremely fortunate to have support from our fellow members and our clergy at Temple Beth Sholom. Talking to one another and sharing our feelings will help us to heal. Please know TBS has been taking additional security measures and staying in contact with our local authorities and law enforcement. Ensuring the safety of our students and congregants is paramount to this institution. On Monday October 9, 2023, there was a rally at TBS attended by our elected officials, the FBI and LV Metro who came out in a show of force, standing steadfast in Israel's right to defend itself and dedicating themselves to the protection of our local Jewish Community. This show of support provided me with a ray of hope, that all is not lost.

TBS is a family, and we are here for you and are here to support our congregation and anyone seeking support in difficult times such as these. It is of the utmost importance that we continue attending events and services at TBS, that we continue sending our children to the ECC and Religious School, and that we stand strong in the face of uncertainty and continue with our collective mantra "Never again!"

Together, Bolder, Stronger ("TBS") is how we will get through these difficult times, as one united voice we cry out *Am Yisrael Chai*!



# THE JUDY & RONALD MACK SCHOOL FOR RELIGIOUS STUDIES

### HEBREW, THE HOLY TONGUE

ne of the most miraculous language revivals of all time, if not the most miraculous one, came about when Eliezer Ben-Yehuda and his contemporaries began to speak, read, and write Hebrew. For years, Hebrew had been the language of Jewish prayer and the holy books, but not a language in which regular people ate, worked, and moved about their daily business.

Ben-Yehuda, who lived from 1858-1922, started a Hebrew-language newspaper in the late Ottoman and British mandate period of Palestine. He also literally wrote the first modern Hebrew dictionary, adding new words as they came into being. And he raised his son as a Hebrew-speaker from birth, the first native speaker of Hebrew in the modern era, with whom he spoke consistently in Hebrew.

Indeed, the most effective way to learn any language is to be spoken to in that language, especially in childhood. In our religious school, we do exactly that with our students during part of our Monday afternoon program. We have been interacting in Hebrew using verbs such as <code>lakoom</code> (to get up), <code>lashevet</code> (to sit down), <code>lalechet</code> (to walk), <code>la'atsor</code> (to stop), <code>larutz</code> (to run), <code>li'kfotz</code> (to jump), and <code>le'histovev</code> (to turn around). The students follow directions given to them only in Hebrew. They are learning without even realizing it, as well as getting some much-needed movement time.

If you know a child in religious school, try using some of these words and see how they respond. Some nouns they know are: *kvootsa* (group), *koolam* (everyone), *delet* (door), *shoolchan* (table), *kiseh* (chair), and *morah* (teacher). We do a lot of repetition, as that is one facet of weekly language learning. We try to introduce three new words every session.

In addition to learning the language, children get comfortable with the sound and rhythm of Hebrew. It helps them when they learn prayers, and eventually as they prepare for their bnei mitzvah, and perhaps for one day when they meet people from Israel. Learning another language is also good for the brain, for creativity, and for building multitasking skills.

You might even be willing to give learning Hebrew a try yourself. As an adult, language-learning is more difficult but perhaps it is also more rewarding. Unlike children, adults can truly appreciate the value of what we are doing. If you'd like to learn or improve your Hebrew, there are many language apps available today. My favorite is Duolingo. It's like having a Hebrew-speaking friend in your pocket. I suggest you give it a try. If you know a child in a religious school, you may want to introduce Duolingo to them as well.

Being introduced to a language is the gateway to learning about the culture and history of a place. Not only that, it is also a way of learning about people. The people of Israel are a fascinating amalgam of Jewry from all over the world. One way you can show your support for Israel during this difficult time is by learning the language and helping others to do so.


