ELUL, ROSH HASHANAH AND THE VOICE OF THE SHOFAR... DAILY REPETITION OR A UNIQUE AND POWERFUL EXPERIENCE EVERY DAY!?

very year as soon as Elul arrives, and we start listening to the voice of The Shofar every morning I struggle with the same idea: How to make sure I don't become so accustomed to one of our daily rituals that I stop listening. How to make sure that repetition does not accomplish the opposite of what it was set to do? It is hard not to become accustomed to something that happens every day for a month...

That in itself is a very powerful and very important message of our tradition; and I believe, a universal truth at it. When things become so common that we don't notice them anymore we start taking everything for granted; the struggle, the day-to-day journey which should be such that even in what becomes a daily ritual we are able to find meaning and relevance. The voice of the shofar calls us to a daily return to God. It also calls us to change and to repair our existence. It does so not once a year, not one month a year but every single day. Elul is just a taste of what a daily process of introspection should look like to all of us. Perhaps, just perhaps the voice of the shofar is not a repetition but a unique, special, and transcendental occurrence every time we truly listen.

Rosh Hashanah is a time when we are traditionally poised to "return to God," but what does that really mean to us as modern Jews in the 21st Century? What does that return exactly look like? Rather than grandiose moments of discovery or what my daughter, Daniela would call "Life Altering Experiences," we need to concentrate on understanding what we have and what it means to return to the core of who we are. Our tradition makes it entirely about our relationship with God. It is also about our relationship with ourselves!

Judaism is a theocentric religion per excellence, hence the Mitzvot! Nonetheless, it is very much about Mitzvot that can only be performed in the context of our daily encounters with our own humanity and that of those around us. Every year, so many people ask me how to approach our prayers... "They simply don't speak to me!" People say all the time. I think we are approaching it the wrong way.

Prayers are the tools, the medium, the suggested beginning to a path. Prayers are supposed to awake us, shake us, and allow us to see that the world, our life, and everything around us should not be taken for granted. It is up to us to understand things with such a sense of daily renewal that ultimately, we feel like we are indeed managing to "return." Remember however that prayers, the shofar, are indeed a metaphor; nothing is literal. How we understand that metaphor is entirely up to us.

I would like to share with you something that always inspires me. It does not come from our liturgy, but I will be reading it in private this year right before I step on The Bimah of our Synagogue on the first night of Rosh Hashanah. It was written by Colombian Author and Nobel Prize of Literature winner Gabriel Garcia Marquez, author of 100 Years of Solitude, and one of Latin America's most acclaimed writers. It is a letter he wrote before he died, and it perfectly illustrates the tension that Rosh Hashanah should evoke within us.

It reminds us that the voice of the shofar is really NOT a repetition but a unique occurrence every time it calls. It reminds us that we can pray as much as we want but that prayer without action is indeed an empty exercise!

"If God, for a second, forgot what I have become and granted me a little bit more of life, I would use it to the best of my ability. I wouldn't, possibly, say everything that is in my mind, but I would be more thoughtful of all I say. I would give merit to things not for what they are worth, but for what they mean to express. I would sleep little, I would dream more, because I know that for every minute that we close our eyes, we waste sixty seconds of light. I would walk while others stop; I would awake while others sleep. If God would give me a little bit more of life, I would dress in a simple manner, I would place myself in front of the sun, leaving not only my body, but my soul naked at its mercy. To all men I would say how mistaken they are when they think that they stop falling in love when they grow old, without knowing that they grow old when they stop falling in love. I would give wings to children, but I would leave it to them to learn how to fly by themselves. To old people I would say that death doesn't arrive when they grow old, but with forgetfulness.

I have learned so much with you all, I have learned that everybody wants to live on top of the mountain, without knowing that true happiness is obtained in the journey taken and the form used to reach the top of the hill. I have learned that when a newborn baby holds, with its little hand, his father's finger, it has trapped him for the rest of his life.

I have learned that a man has the right and obligation to look down at another man, only when that man needs help to get up from the ground. Say always what you feel, not what you think. If I knew that today is the last time that I am going to see you asleep, I would hug you with all my strength and I would pray to the Lord to let me be the guardian angel of your soul. If I knew that these are the last moments to see you, I would say 'I love you'.

There is always tomorrow, and life gives us another opportunity to do things right, but in case I am wrong, and today is all that is left to me, I would love to tell you how much I love you and that I will never forget you.

Tomorrow is never guaranteed to anyone, young or old. Today could be the last time to see your loved ones, which is why you mustn't wait; do it today, in case tomorrow never arrives. I am sure you will be sorry you wasted the opportunity today to give a smile, a hug, a kiss, and that you were too busy to grant them their last wish.

Keep your loved ones near you; tell them in their ears and to their faces how much you need them and love them. Love them and treat them well; take your time to tell them 'I am sorry';' forgive me',' please' 'thank you', and all those loving words you know. Nobody will know you for your secret thought. Ask the Lord for wisdom and strength to express them. Show your friends and loved ones how important they are to you.

Send this letter to those you love. If you don't do it today, tomorrow will be like yesterday, and if you never do it, it doesn't matter, either the moment to do it is now."

The new Board elected in May has met and established the budget and goals for 2022-2023. The TBS membership roster has grown to exceed 456 active family members. Continuing the news on enrollment increases, enrollment in the Early Childhood Center is also strong. I believe we have already met our targeted number of students with more children enrolling each week. It is a great feeling to have the positive energy and excitement return to both of our young person educational programs. A big thank you and shout-out to all the team members who supported both programs, and work hard each day to keep the curriculum vibrant and exciting.

Staying with the positive news. TBS has a couple of major fundraising efforts underway along with tremendous news regarding the Temple's endowment.

Two major fundraising efforts underway are the rededication of select seats in the Temple Sanctuary. The Board has identified a number of sanctuary seats that are available for re-dedication. Please contact Clayton Steinberg in the Temple office for details and a seating map for your reference if you choose to be involved.

The second fundraising effort is the Six13 Group concert coming up in December. Advertisements and emails are being distributed so please look for these mailings to get specific information. And as always, feel free to contact the Temple office if you have any questions or wish to purchase tickets for the Six13 Group event.

My report is not complete without giving proper recognition and thanks to the Kronberg Family. Temple Beth Sholom and the Warsaw Memorial Garden have each received very generous donations to both of their endowments. The Kronberg Family has always been a bedrock supporter for the TBS Community, and their contributions to the endowments further show their commitment to our wellbeing. The continued growth of the Temple Beth Sholom restricted endowment is critical to the long-term sustainability of our congregation.

May the coming months treat you and yours well. I am looking forward to seeing everyone "in person" during the High Holy Days services.

WHEREVER YOU GO, THERE'S ALWAYS SOMEONE JEWISH?


here's a song that we used to sing with the USY kids, that has a sweeping main chorus: "Wherever you go, there's always someone Jewish — you're never alone when you say you're a Jew!" The song's lyrics include ideas about Jews living in places like Amsterdam, Disneyland, and Tel Aviv. Supposedly, the idea the song is trying to convey is that there are really Jews all over the world, so one shouldn't feel left out or lonely. The problem with this idea is that it's, well... wrong.

When I was living in Austin Texas during the teacher recession of 2011, I was driving over and over through the countryside every day to get to work in the tiny town of Waelder. While there certainly weren't Jews in Waelder, at least the people there saw me — and knew that bearded men with Yarmulkes existed. The between towns of this journey, however, (some with populations of less than 100 people), seemed perplexed when I stopped at their tiny gas station to fill up. Once while buying a bottle of water in a store, the clerk asked me: "What are you supposed to be, some kind of Jew?"

Over the course of the next two months, we'll celebrate the High Holidays here at Temple Beth Sholom. Among the many stories we'll read and talk about, one of the most prolific characters is Abraham. Seeing as how he was the first Jew, he really was the exception to the song I mentioned above — because everywhere he went, he literally was the only Jew around. God tells him to "go for yourself" — essentially to travel to a new spot, initiate a new tradition and a new people.

Being the first of a people isn't always easy, and throughout his narrative — Abraham encounters personal problems along the way. He grows, is tested, is broken — and then grows some more. But throughout his journey, he remains faithful to his new God, and even to himself.

I wonder what it could mean for us to take this journey as well. Obviously, I'm not advocating that we all move to Israel and make a journey to Beer Sheba; but perhaps we could initiate new traditions of our own. Maybe during our prayers this year, we can think of new ways to interact with God, each other, and ourselves. Hey, wherever we go — there's always someone Jewish!






